

Virginia Voter Registration and Turnout Lesson Plan

Target Audience: 12th grade government students

Length: 1 day (90—minute class)

Objectives

The students will:

1. Identify and explain voter requirements for residents of Virginia.
2. Describe the procedures used to register to vote in Virginia.
3. Describe the changes or trends in voter participation.
4. Analyze statistical data to determine which groups of people vote the most and which vote the least.
5. Identify and explain factors that influence voter turnout.

1. Overview

In this lesson, students will examine several documents related to voter registration and turnout. Students will use their analysis of these documents to address the following questions:

- What are the requirements and procedures for registering to vote in Virginia?
- How does the process of registering to vote in Virginia affect voter turnout?
- What other factors influence voter turnout?

2. Activities

- Distribute copies of the *Virginia Voter Registration Application Form*; *Table 400. Voting-Age Population, Percent Reporting Registered, and Voted*; and *Table 403. Resident Population of Voting Age and Percent Casting Votes*. Working in groups of three or four, students will analyze the primary sources using Handout #1: *Primary Source Analysis Questions*.

3. Group Discussion

- Write three columns on the board: Notice, Questions and Background. Using Handout #1: *Primary Source Analysis Questions* responses, fill-in the columns as a class.

4. Background Information

Importance of Voting

- The right to vote is one of the fundamental rights of citizens in a democratic society. Without it, citizens would not be able to choose the people who will run their government. Voting is a major responsibility of citizenship. Those who do not vote are failing to carry out a civic responsibility. They are also handing over their share of political power to voters whose views they may oppose.

Requirements for Voter Registration

- To be eligible to register to vote in Virginia a person must: be a resident of Virginia; be a U. S. Citizen; be 18 years old on or before election day; does not claim the right to vote in any other State; not currently declared mentally incompetent by a court of law; and if convicted of a felony, your right to vote must have been restored (Source: Virginia State Board of Elections www.sbe.virginia.gov).

Influences on Voter Turnout

- Many factors influence voter turnout in elections. People are more likely to vote in elections which they feel strongly about a candidate or issue. Voter attitude toward government or a particular political party can also have a strong affect on voter turnout. Age, income, and education are important factors in predicting which citizens will vote. More citizens vote in presidential elections than in other national, state, or local contests, but the percentage of Americans voting in presidential elections is on the decline. Voter apathy, dissatisfaction, and the failure to meet the registration requirements contribute to the decline in voting.
- As the documents indicate, voters age 61-64 are more likely to vote while those 21-24 are least likely to go to the polls. Similarly, those with higher education are more likely to register and vote. In both congressional and presidential races, females are more likely to vote than males.

5. Conclusion

Conclude the lesson with a group discussion in which students answer the following questions:

1. How do potential voters view these documents?
2. What problems could the registration form cause potential voters?
3. How could organizations and communities combat the problem of low voter turnout?

6. Differentiation

For remedial students:

- Write three columns on the board: Background, Most Likely to Vote, and Least Likely to Vote. Using Handout #2: *Primary Source Analysis Questions* responses, fill-in the columns as a class.

For advanced students:

- Write three columns on the board: Notice, Trends, and Strategies for Improvement. Using Handout #3: *Primary Source Analysis Questions* responses, fill-in the columns as a class.

7. SOL Skills

The student will demonstrate mastery of the social studies skills citizenship requires, including the ability to

- select and defend positions in writing, discussion, and debate (GOVT.1.g).

The student will demonstrate knowledge of local, state, and national elections by analyzing voter turnout (GOVT.6.g).

Virginia Voter Registration Application Form

Instructions

You are not officially registered to vote until this application is approved.

You should receive a Voter Card in the mail. If you do not receive this acknowledgement within 30 days after mailing this form, please contact your city or county voter registration office or the State Board of Elections. If you are already registered to vote with your current name and address, you do not need to re-register. If you have any questions regarding your voter registration status, please call your local Voter Registration Office.

Identification Requirement

For Registration

If you are registering for the first time by mail, federal law (the Help America Vote Act) requires you to provide identification. To avoid delays, please **enclose a copy of one of the following documents** that shows your **name and address** with your application: (1) current and valid photo ID, (2) current utility bill, (3) bank statement, (4) government check, (5) paycheck, or (6) other government document. You can also present this required identification at the polls but may experience delays.

For Voting

Virginia law requires every voter voting in person to show identification or sign a statement, subject to felony penalties for false statements pursuant to §24.2-1016, that the person is the named registered voter.

Mailing Instructions

- Detach the return envelope that is provided.
- Write your name and return address in the space provided on the front.
- Write the address of the voter registration office for the county or city where you live. List provided on the next page.
- Must be POSTMARKED at least 29 days before the next Primary or General Election in which you plan to vote.

Privacy Act Notice: Article II, Section 2 of the Constitution of Virginia (1971) requires that a person registering to vote provide his or her social security number, if any. Therefore, if you do not provide your social security number, your application for voter registration will be denied. Section 7 of the Federal Privacy Act (Public Law Number 93-579) allows the Commonwealth to enforce this requirement, but also requires that you be advised that state and local voting officials will use the social security number as a unique identifier to ensure that no person is registered in more than one place. This registration card will not be open to inspection by the public. Your social security number will appear on reports produced only for official use by voter registration and election officials, and for jury selection purposes by courts.

WARNING: INTENTIONALLY MAKING A MATERIALLY FALSE STATEMENT ON THIS FORM CONSTITUTES THE CRIME OF ELECTION FRAUD, WHICH IS PUNISHABLE UNDER VIRGINIA LAW AS A FELONY. VIOLATORS MAY BE SENTENCED TO UP TO 10 YEARS IN PRISON, OR UP TO 12 MONTHS IN JAIL AND/OR FINED UP TO \$2,500.
